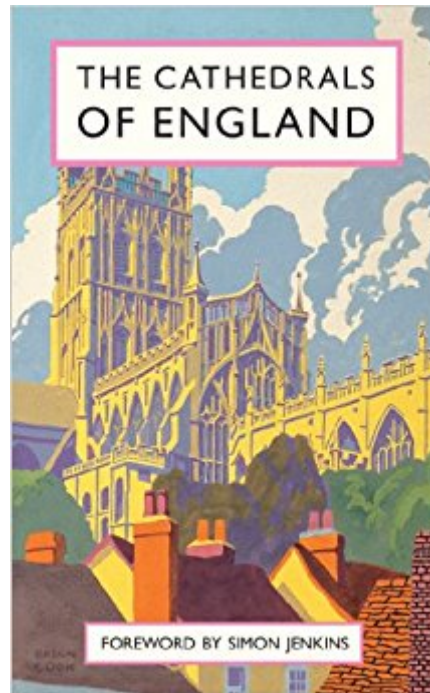

The writing as well as the "physical make up" of the book reflect its original publication date of the book: 1934. In my view, that is part of the book's charm.
