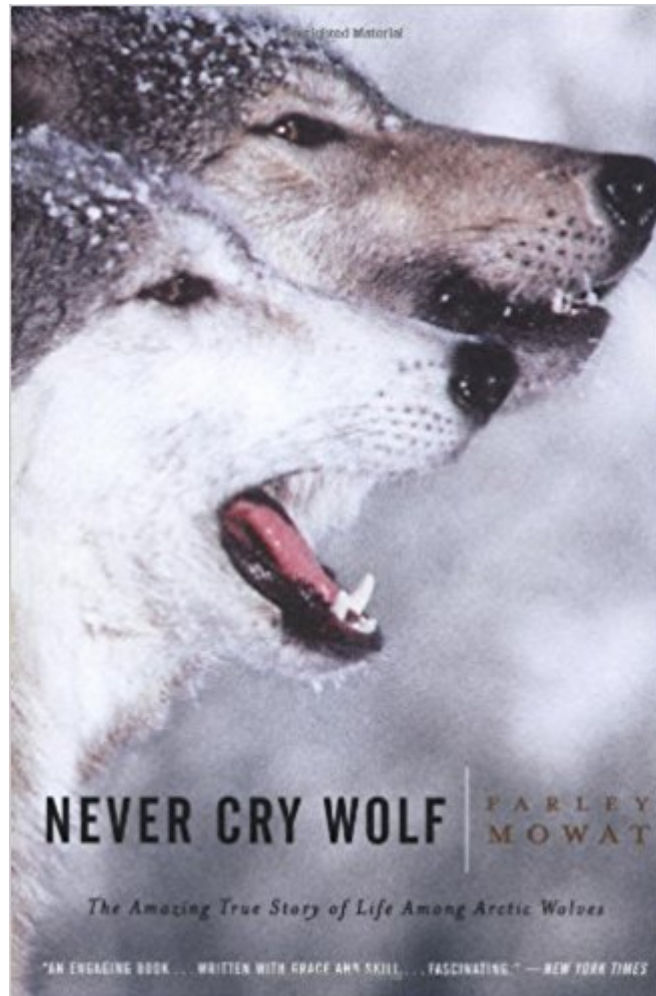

Never Cry Wolf is a good, funny book that's actually quite endearing. It's also one of those unique novels that changed the way people think in a positive way. Yes, it's pretty clear it's a novel. I didn't know anything about the controversy surrounding the book until I finished reading it but I knew right away that aspects of the book didn't ring true. The notion that the government would simply drop an inexperienced greenhorn in the territory 300 miles north of Churchill, Manitoba to engage in research all by himself sounded improbable. The author's fortuitous discovery of friendly Eskimo's seemed a little too convenient. However, once you accept that this isn't really a true story, you're in for a lot of fun. The scene where the author is cooking for Eskimo visitors who quite understandably think he is insane is priceless. The wolves are charming and that was deliberate and important. Mowat can be accused of self aggrandizement and has been accused of plagiarism (I don't know if that's true). This book was for the wolves and it served them well.

Mowat writes his compelling story with a satirical path and with self-deprecating humor. A real classic!
